Application of Quantitative Techniques

Key Findings of the Study

• Nutrition Garden: All the beneficiaries (100%) received different types of vegetable seeds as per the season and soil. Fertilizer, training, marketing & regular follow-ups are the reported supports under the program.

Research Methodology

- Smokeless Chulla: All the beneficiaries (100%) reported receiving smokeless chulla along with 5 days of handholding training. Regular follow-up by the project staff is also reported by all the beneficiaries.
- **MMU:** Services like free medicine, hemoglobin test, guidance on breastfeeding, regular health check-ups of children, reminders for ANC date, sonography date, and vaccination date are being reported by the beneficiaries
- **mMitra**: 97.7% of the mothers reported receiving the calls post-ANC check-ups and ultrasounds.
- HoW: All the mothers reported receiving services; free medicine, hemoglobin test, and health check-ups of the children. Supports like guidance on nutrition & Iron & folic tablets are also reported by the beneficiaries.

Key Impact Created

- 98% of the respondents shared that there was a significant change in their food platter. 97% observed overall improvement in the health condition of the children and other family members.
- All the beneficiaries (100%) reported multiple improvements at the household level; decrease in cooking time, decrease in work-load, improved air quality with reduced smoke, improved health conditions, and reduced fuel cost through smokeless chulla.
- Most of the mothers (95-100%) confirmed ANC registration in the government facilities and completed their ANC check-ups, while children (98%) got vaccinated promptly as well.
- Majority of the mother (90.7%) had gone for due ANC check-ups while 69.8% had done their ultrasound on time post-receiving the calls.
- 100% of respondents reported that they had registered their pregnancy on time at different governmental health institutions and had completed all ANC check-ups and vaccination of their children.

Key Findings of the Study

- All the swimmers have been receiving different support at GAF; gym training, guidance on nutrition and balanced diet, counseling, and flooding & lodging.
- All the swimmers mentioned that the duration of training (2-4 hrs) at GAF is either adequate (65%) or more than enough (5%).
- All the swimmers mentioned that coaching support at GAF is effective to perform at their optimum levels and achieve their desired goals.

Key Impact Created

- 95% of the swimmers confirmed increasing speed, improved timing, and better finishing whereas 81% reported of increasing strength due to the training provided by GAF.
- All of the swimmers mentioned that they have learned new swimming techniques which have helped them to finish their laps in a short duration.
- The majority of the swimmers (80%) have already participated in National & International events.
- 85% of the swimmers mentioned that counselling support helped them to cope with anxiety/mental stress to perform better in any situation.

3. Sustainable Livelihoods Initiative Implementing Partners: Multiple Skill Development Agencies





Key Findings of the Study

- The majority of the beneficiaries' families primary occupation is either farming (51.3%) or daily wage workers (30.8%).
- The majority of the beneficiaries' families (65%) monthly income is less than Rs.15,000/- .
- The overall retention level of the program was observed as good; 67% of the interns remain in the internship program & 17% completed the internship program.
- 52% of trainee receives more than Rs.10,000 as a stipend every month and 47% receive between Rs.5,000/- to Rs.10,000/- as a stipend.
- 78% are supporting their families financially through the stipend amount, while 38% started savings from the stipend.
- 81% confirmed that the Internship program helps the beneficiaries to get a better job upon completion.

Key Impact Created

- 94% that have completed their course got full-time jobs and 69% of them have been earning between Rs.10,000/- to Rs.15,000/-.
- 94% of them are able to provide financial support to their families and 65% of them contribute towards expenses for improvement of the standard of living.

Key Findings of the Study

- Covid Relief Ration distribution (Sundarban, WB): All the beneficiaries reported receiving the ration kit (10 kg atta, 1 kg sattu, and 2 kg soybean). 35% reported the quality was excellent, and 65% said the quality was good. Likewise, the packaging condition is good enough, as reported by the mothers.
- **COVID Relief distribution (Khandwa, MP):** 27% of mothers reported receiving the ration every month. On the other hand, the rest of 73% of the respondents shared that they received the ration every alternate month.
- COVID Health Care Staff Training Program (Delhi/NCR): 100% of the respondents shared that they received all the relevant information and knowledge.

Key Impact Created

- All the mothers reported that sufficient and quality rations were distributed for monthly consumption which was the direct support during the lockdown.
- Majority of the mothers (70%) said the quality of the ration was excellent, and 30% said the quality was good. Likewise, the packaging condition is good enough.
- 100% of recipients indicated that good knowledge was provided through training. All important and relevant subjects were discussed during the training. 68% of the respondents shared that they became confident in myths and misconceptions regarding Covid -19.
